Risk Factors: Participants affected by extreme heat or cold, fire danger, smoke inhalation, high winds Considerations: Weather conditions to be monitored and assessed using the Guidelines for Outdoor Activities in Extreme Conditions	3	3	M	 Weather conditions to be monitored via BOM Fire danger rating monitored through ACT ESA Postpone tours when: FDI is 'extreme' The temperature is anticipated to be over 37 degrees at the time of the event Extreme cold or rain High winds over 45km/hour ALL tours cancelled if TOBAN Woodlands and Wetland supervising staff to inform teachers and students if tours are postponed due to severe weather conditions ACTPCS and WWT to liaise regarding Sanctuary conditions during severe weather Outreach officers have current First Aid training and carry a First Aid kit and a Snake bite kit during snake season Teachers to enforce SunSmart policy, hats, sunscreen and appropriate clothing in heat and cold. 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5. Risks: Students wandering off and becoming lost, inappropriate student behaviour, damage to property, bullying, noncompliance to sanctuary rules, increased risk to group safety. Considerations: All student tours must have Teacher/Adult supervision ratios in accordance with the directorate's Mandatory Procedures	3	3	M	 Students to be supervised by at least one registered teacher at all times Teacher's responsibility to nominate appropriate volunteers to care for students. Staff supervision ratios must be met in accordance with the directorate's Mandatory Procedures All students made aware of activity boundaries at start or session Outreach officers provide a General Safety and Emergence Evacuation briefing to participants prior to the tour commencing It is the teacher's responsibility to ensure the entire group is regularly checked and accounted for. The Outreach officer reserves the right to stop the activity in the event of inappropriate activity including damage to property, bullying, and general non compliance to sanctuary rules Outreach officer to stop activity in the event of wandering student – visiting teacher to assist with locating student, but must not jeopardise group ratios by leaving activity Search of last known location and immediate area by starency for last known location and immediate area by starency services to be contacted if student is unable to be located within a reasonable time frame based on weather, student, time of day Outreach officers have a list of emergency contact number and always call 000 first in a life-threatening situation Outreach officers to download the Emergency + app on their phone which can provide a GPS location for an emergency services response 		2	L	Woodlands and Wetlands Trust Staff and supervising teachers
